


Reception Newsletter: Spring Term, Week 10

This week's Phonics sounds:




Don't forget to use your Phonics keyrings to practise reading and writing these sounds.


In English, we have been innovating on our story of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children have been writing their own stories about themselves and the beanstalk. They have been changing lots of parts of the story including who they sell the cow to, whether it is a cow, how many beans they get, whether they want to change the 'magic' beans to a different type of bean, what Jack takes etc.


We have had some super inventive stories and the children have made huge progress with their writing! Here are some examples:













The children made patterns from chosen objects including pencils, counters, toys and even fruit. They looked at AB patterns and have begun to look at ABC patterns.
