Information booklet


Your child is learning to read with Floppy's Phonics, a step-by-step synthetic phonics reading scheme. It introduces the children to the letters and sounds - the alphobetic code - that will become the foundation of their reading and writing.

Your child's school has a subscription to Flappy's Phonics Online on Oxford Owl.

This booklet shows you how you can help your child practise and consolidate their reading skills by using the Extra Practice Zone.


What is the Extra Practice Zone?

The Extra Practice Zone is an area on Fioppy's Phonics Online where your child can practise their phonics skills at home, with the help of an adult. It contains 42 interactive eBooks, each affering a range of activities that will help improve your child's reading skills. Your child may have already practised some of these activities at school, either with the whole class or on their own.



Vowel hand

We have noticed that the children are mixing up some of the vowels, so we have been learning this song to help us identify the difference. The vowel hand is helping us to keep track of the vowels:



b and d rap

We have noticed the children are sometimes mixing up 'b' and 'd'.

This rap may help you see the difference between the two.

We use it a lot in class.


'b' and 'd' we're going to put them to bed.

No need to mix them up I said.

When you think of 'b' think about baseball.

You do the 'bat' and then you do the 'ball'.



When you think of 'd' start drumming quick.

You do the 'drum' and then the 'drumstick'.


We are trying hard to write full sentences. We are using this checklist to help us in Phonics and English lessons.

Jack and the Beanstalk story maps


Here are the class story maps for Jack and the Beanstalk:






In English, we planted beans and then wrote about them, creating our own Non-fiction pieces of writing. This linked very well to our Forest School and Topic work about growing.










We used tens frames and tried to show number bonds to 10. We looked at ones on screen and compared them to part-whole models. The children wrote number sentences to match.

Pancake Party!!

Shrove Tuesday, also known as Pancake Day, is always in February and is the day before Lent starts. In the old days that was when all of the yummy eggs and dairy in the house had to get finished before the fasting started that goes on all the way to Easter Sunday!

This year Chef Suzie & I have a yummy American pancake recipe for you: you can load them with blueberries, banana or chocolate... and LOADS of maple syrup! Enjoy!

Makes 6 big ones



Ingredients:

200g plain flour 2 tbsp unsalted butter, melted and cooled, plus extra for cooking 1 % tsp baking powder 2 tbsp caster sugar Choc chips 240ml milk Banana, sliced Maple syrup

2 eggs Method:

- 1. Sift the flour, baking powder, and sugar into a mixing bowl.
- In a separate small bowl or jug, lightly whisk together the milk and 2 eggs, then whisk in the cooled melted butter.
- Pour the wet mixture into the bowl with the dry mixture and beat lightly until roughly combined but still a bit lumpy (for American pancakes you specifically want lumps!).
- 4. Leave to stand for 5 minutes.
- 5. Heat the oven to 180C.
- 6. Brush a 25x20x2cm baking tray with melted butter.
- 7. Pour the batter into the tin and level the surface with a spatula,
- Scatter your chosen toppings on and bake in the oven for 15-20 mins or until the middle of the pancake feels cooked.
- Leave to cool then dust with icing sugar and either cut into squares, or use a ring cutter and snack on the trimmings!
